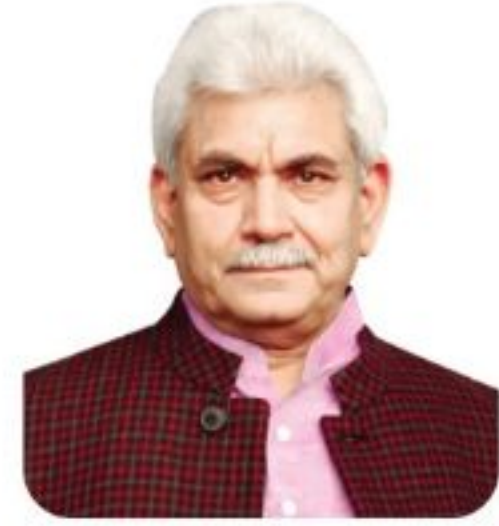

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# Introducing the DGGI

## Introduction

Good Governance aims to ensure civil, cultural, economic, social and political rights of the general public while upholding the administrators and policy makers accountable. It protects the interests of the people and emphasizes on public sector management, legal developmental framework, accountability and transparency.

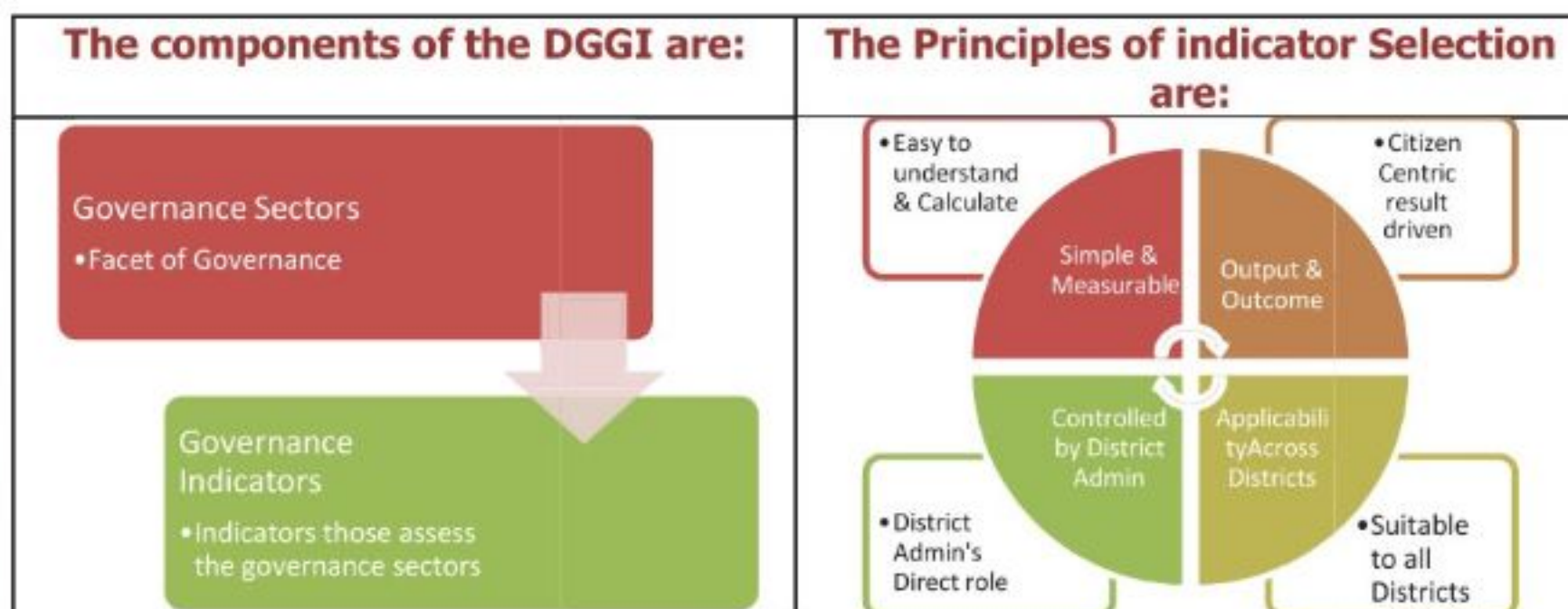
Good governance being the soul of public delivery system of a government have measureable parameters through which it assesses the performance across various divisions/ units of an administrative setup over a period of time.

Under the decentralized planning, district is the primary unit of field administration, engaged in implementation of various welfare programmes and projects for the well being of the citizens. A proper measurement of the performance, therefore, becomes necessary to remain focused on good governance initiatives and future planning, which leads to holistic development of the administrative unit. Good governance initiatives are reflected over a period of time in people's participation, rule of law, transparency, responsiveness, consensus oriented, equity and inclusiveness, effectiveness and efficiency, accountability etc.

The process of measurement of Good Governance was initiated in the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir in year 2021-22 by J&K-IMPARD under the guidance of Department of Administrative Reforms and Public Grievance (DARPG), Government of India, in coordination with Directorate of Economics and Statistics J&K. The first report of DGGI J&K was released in January, 2022.

The main objective behind the process was to assess the performance of governance in all 20 District of UT of Jammu and Kashmir based on identified sectors and indicators so as to promote healthy competition among the districts.

The DGGI (1.0 & 2.0) brings out the rankings of various sectors and districts and presents a comparative picture amongst the Districts about Citizen Centric Administration Governance viz-a-viz generates healthy competition among districts. This DGGI report will certainly guide the District Administration and other stake holders to identify and suitably bridge the gaps in deliverables to ensure holistic development of the district.



## DGGI 2.0 Methodology

Data for DGGI 2.0 has been captured from various districts and the process has been followed for calculating sector and indicator-wise scores to arrive at final ranking of the Districts. DGGI 2.0 has been segregated into 10 sectors comprising of 58 indicators based on the selection of the indicators identified by the DARPG, GoI, in the first DGGI report.

- The data on the identified sectors/ selected indicators has been obtained from the districts and has been scrutinized/ analyzed by the Directorate of Economics and Statistics and put to further calculation as per the decided methodology and formulas for the measurement of Good Governance Index.
- In some indicators growth over the period has been used while as others are target driven.
- The raw data has been normalized using Dimensional Index Method and subsequently used for ranking purpose after applying the respective weight-age assigned to the indicators.
- Sectors have been assigned equal weights across all sectors.
- Scores of selected indicators have been aggregated to arrive at the Sector Score and thereby, arriving at a Sector Rank. Sector Scores are then aggregated for calculating the Composite District Rank.

## Computation of DGGI 2.0

### Step I: Compilation of Necessary Data/ Information

Computation of scores for different indicators under 10 sectors prescribed in the DGGI Framework requires data on a large number of facets covering various aspects of governance at district level. The base year used for growth based indicators in the DGGI 1.0 has been kept intact. The data for this purpose has been collected from the District Development Commissioners.

### Step II: Normalization of Indicator Values

Variables with mixed scales have been converted into dimensionless entities, so that they can be compared and used for ranking purpose easily, which is known as **normalization**. There are various methods available to normalize variables and attain scores for the Districts based on their performance on the identified indicators for compiling sector-wise/district-wise ranking. For the purpose of ranking the Districts as part of DGGI, the **Dimensional Index Methodology** has been used.

In this method, the normalized value of each indicator is obtained by subtracting the minimum value among the set from the raw value of indicators and then dividing it by the data range (maximum – minimum value). The maximum and minimum values for each

indicator are ascertained based on the raw values for that indicator across the Districts combining all Districts without considering the existing Divisional (Jammu and Kashmir Divisions) categorization. This approach is specifically adopted so that such calculation would permit comparison across all Districts and can also be used for generating overall ranks without considering the categorization.

The following two equations have been used to normalise the indicator values:

**Dimensional Score for Positive Indicators:**

$$\text{Score} = \frac{(\text{Indicator Value} - \text{Minimum Value})}{(\text{Maximum Value} - \text{Minimum Value})}$$

**Dimensional Score for Negative Indicators:**

$$\text{Score} = \frac{(\text{Maximum Value} - \text{Indicator Value})}{(\text{Maximum Value} - \text{Minimum Value})}$$

**Where:**

**Positive Indicator** = for which Higher Value is better

**Negative Indicator** = for which Lower Value is better

**Indicator Value** = Available through Secondary Sources

**Maximum Value** = Highest Indicator Value among the Districts

**Minimum Value** = Lowest Indicator Value among the Districts

The above-mentioned equations have been used directly by taking the values of indicators for reference year. In case of the growth-based indicators, this exercise has been undertaken after calculating Compound Annual Growth Rate (CAGR) over base year to reference year for each indicator. The following equation has been used for calculating CAGR:

$$\text{CAGR} = (\text{Value of Reference Year} / \text{Value of Base Year})^{(1/n)-1} \times 100$$

where: n = number of periods

**Step III: Assigning Weightages**

**a. Equal Weightage to Sectors:**

As mentioned earlier, while conceptualizing DGGI, various aspects of governance, which are critical for growth, development and inclusiveness have been measured which have been clustered under ten sectors. All the identified ten sectors are facets of equal importance from the point of view of citizen-centric approach for such comprehensive index at District level.

**b. Differential Weightages for Indicators:**

Outcome / output-based indicators were given priority for indicator selection and at the same time selection was restricted due to availability of data. Therefore, the outcome / output-based indicators are assigned higher weightage whereas proxy indicators (input/process based) are assigned lower weightage. Assigning higher weightages to outcome/output-based indicators brings the focus on performance and achievements of the Districts.

#### **Step IV: Computation of Scores and Ranking**

After completing data normalization process, the normalized value of each indicator needs to be multiplied with weightage assigned to the indicator in order to obtain the final indicator score. These final individual indicator scores are aggregated to obtain a value for the sector. These aggregated values after multiplication with sector weight becomes the score for the sector and once sector wise scores are aggregated, it becomes District's DGGI Score to be used for ranking purpose.

#### **Limitations:**

Every statistical inference is bound to have accuracy to a limit, therefore, results cannot be 100% accurate and as per the expectations of the stake holders. However, every statistician tries to increase the level of accuracy and arrive at the most accurate results. It is also a fact, that while working on the indices, the hypothesis, selection of set of indicators and the methodology used determines the outcome of the study. If the hypothesis is subject to change, the results will automatically vary.

The results of this document (DGGI 2.0) is based on the methodology and set of indicators used in DGGI 1.0 which was vetted by Center for Good Governance, Hyderabad that primarily focuses on delta changes. However, the system is evolving and the directorate is open to make changes in the methodology as well as set of indicators with time based on the willingness of the departments concerned/ districts and availability of data from these sources.

#### **Way ahead:**

The District Good Governance Index is a move towards measurement of development. The index represents quantifiable data concerning the development and growth of various districts and the data is useful to strategize future policies and development plans and is subjected to evolve with time.





## Composite DGGI 2.0 score 2021-22

### Ranking with Final Score (UT)

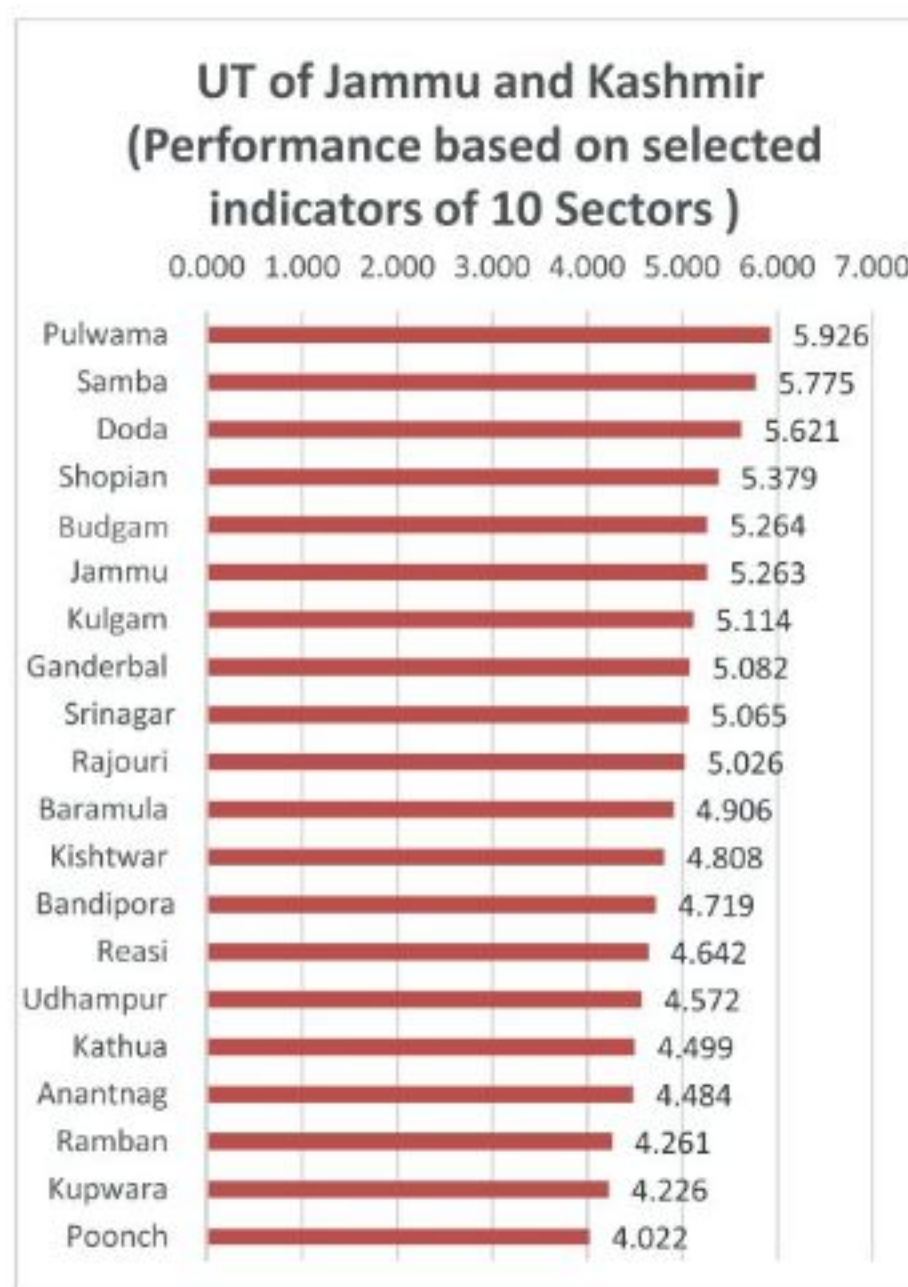
Composite DGGI 2.0 score of 20 districts was computed at UT level by aggregating the scores of 10 sectors i.e i. Agriculture & Allied Sectors ii. Industries & Allied Sectors iii. Human Resource Development iv. Public Health v. Public Infrastructure & Utilities vi. Financial Inclusion vii. Social Welfare & Development viii. Judicial & Public Safety ix. Environment x. Citizen Centric Governance.

District Pulwama has secured rank first in the DGGI 2021-22 with an aggregate composite score of 5.926 while as District Samba and District Doda has secured second and third rank respectively.

District Srinagar has secured rank first in Public Infrastructure and Utilities Sectors and also in Agriculture & Allied Sectors. District Doda has topped in Industries & Allied Sectors along with Environment Sector. District Pulwama has topped in HRD and Judiciary & Public Sectors. District Rajouri has topped in Public Health, District Ramban has topped in Social Welfare, District Ganderbal in Financial Inclusion, District Samba in Citizen Centric Governance sector and District Shopian and District Kishtwar (along with District Doda) in Environment Sectors.

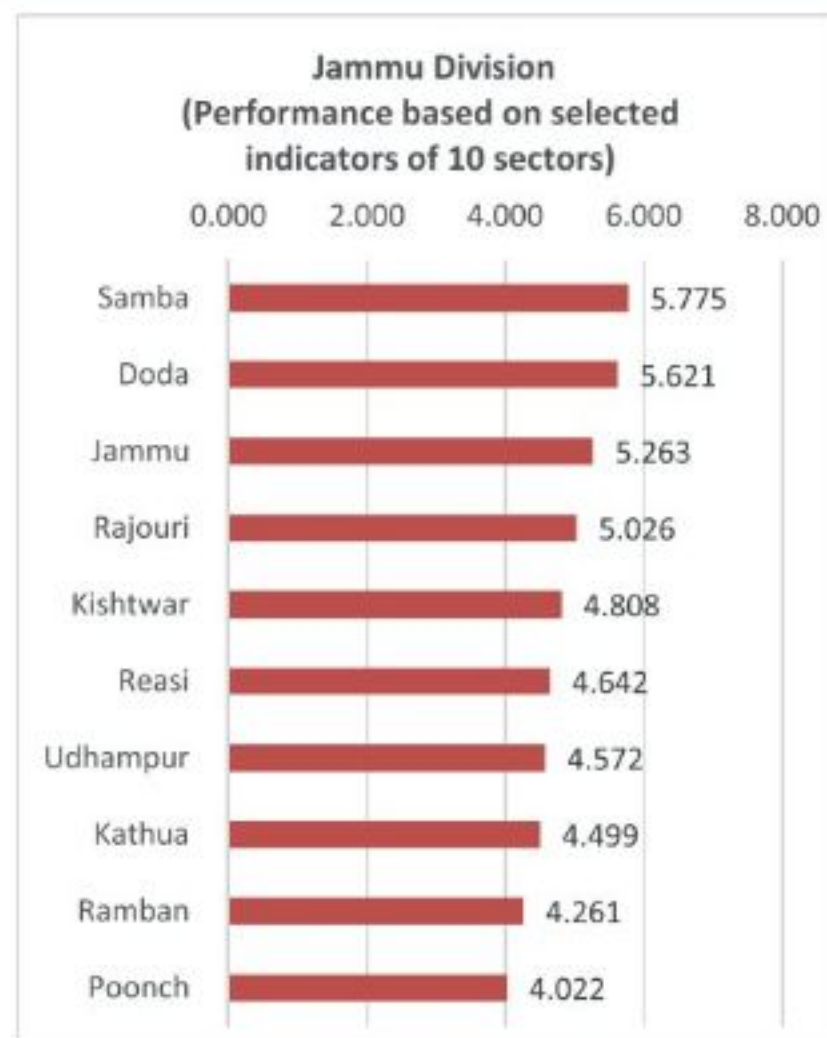

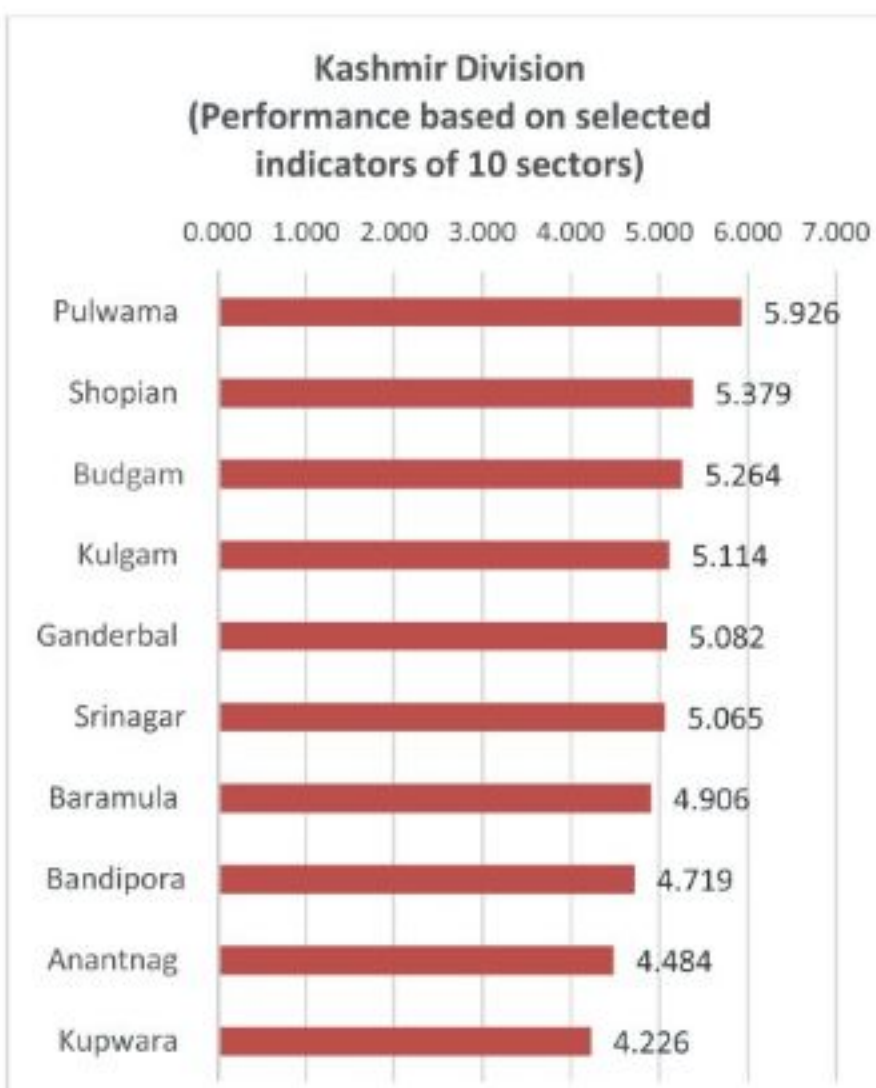

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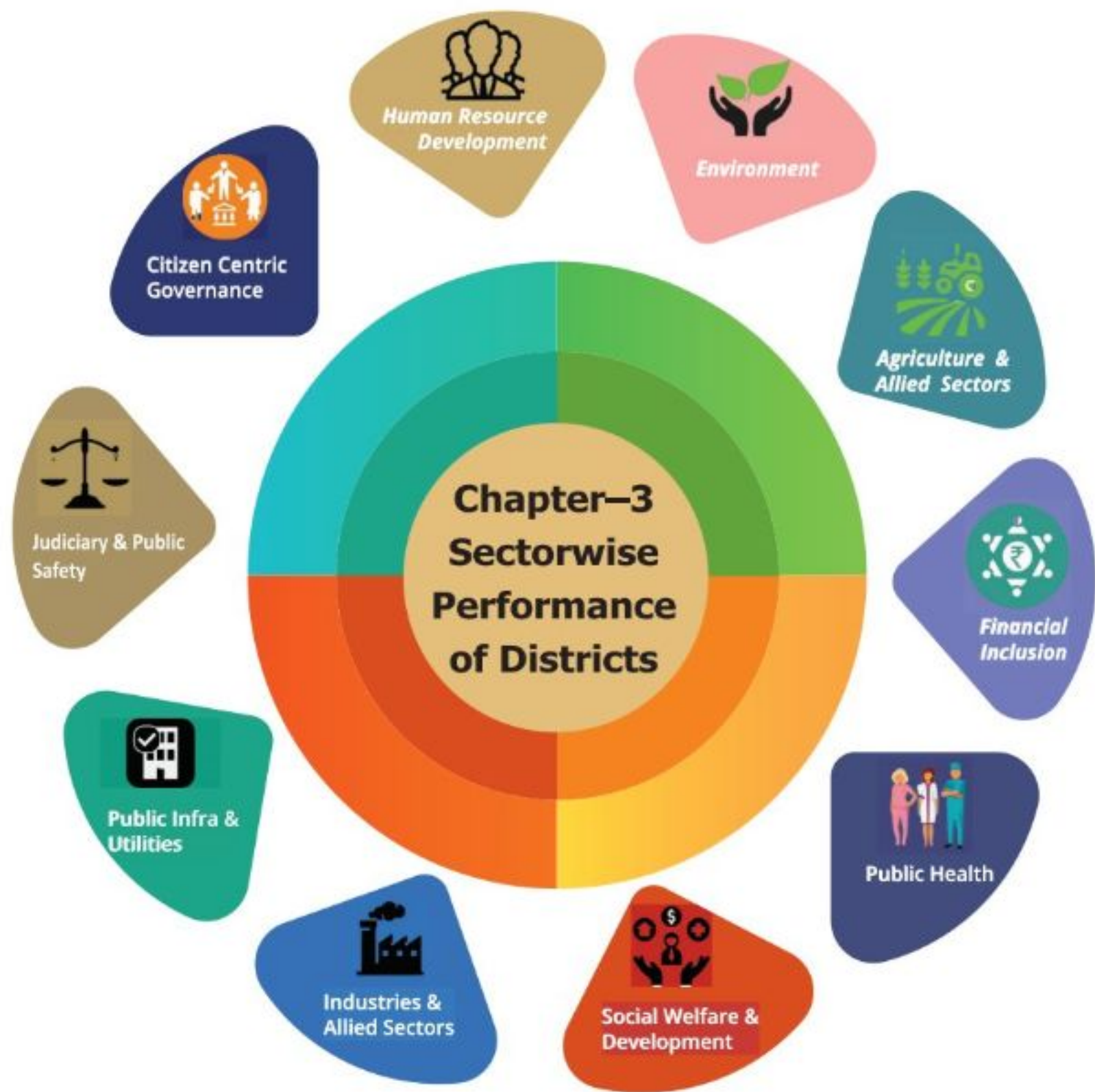

### Sector-wise Performance

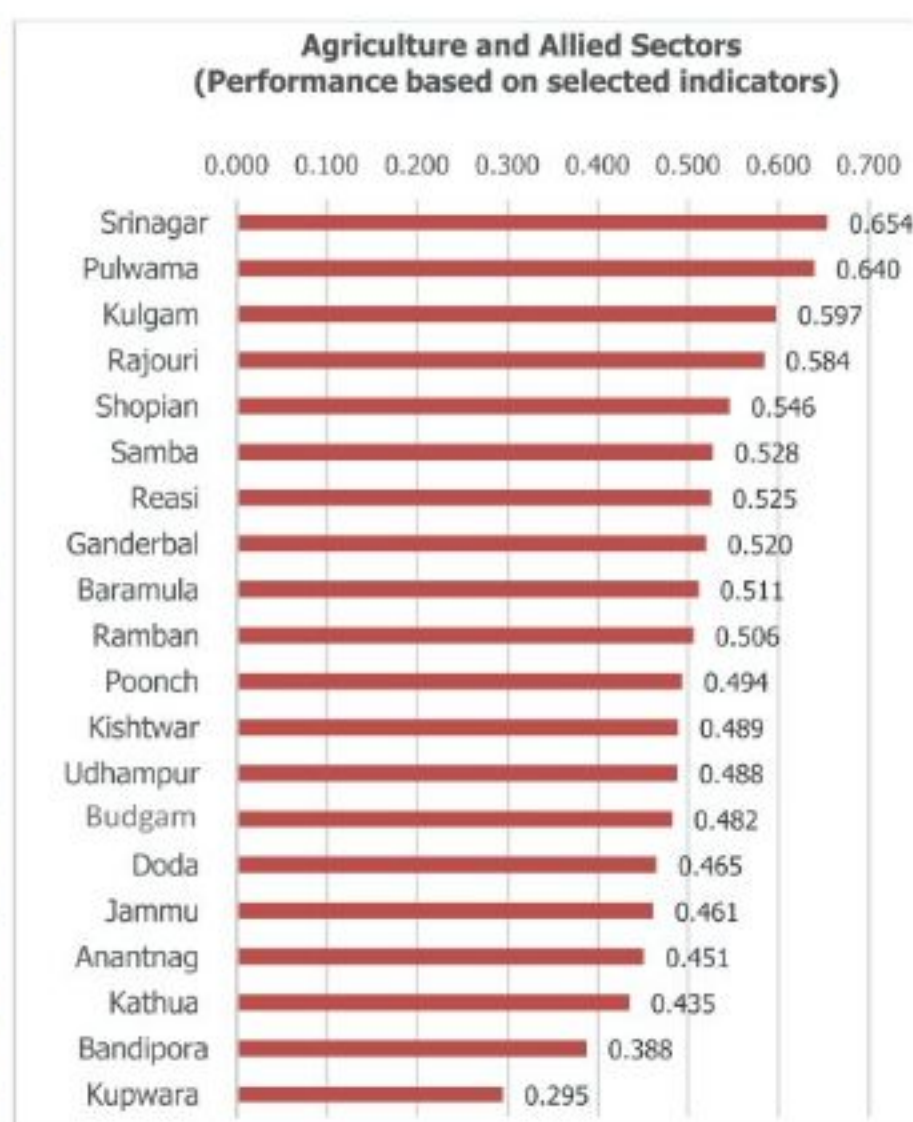
Composite DGGI 2.0 score of 20 districts was computed at UT level by aggregating the scores of 10 sectors i.e i. Agriculture & Allied Sectors ii. Industries & Allied Sectors iii. Human Resource Development iv. Public Health v. Public Infrastructure & Utilities vi. Financial Inclusion vii. Social Welfare & Development viii. Judicial & Public Safety ix. Environment x. Citizen Centric Governance. The sector-wise performance is presented below:-

#### I. Agriculture & Allied Sectors

Agriculture and Allied being primary sectors contribute considerably towards economic wellbeing of Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir. The UT has a distinct geographical outlook having two agro climatic zones and each zone has its own particular climatic character that describes its cropping pattern, productivity, production etc. The production of food grains in the UT does not keep pace with the requirement, as the agriculture sector faces challenges on various fronts. Acknowledging that agriculture and allied services greatly differ from one region to the other, an attempt has been made to follow proper sub-sector stratification and only generic indicators have been included to maintain parity and have a sense of cohesion while preparation and finalization of good governance index on the basis of selected indicators. 11 indicators have been identified under this sector with a focus on output and institutional support like crop insurance, animal vaccination, kisan credit card, soil health card etc. In order to maintain parity and have a sense of commonality, attempt has been made to aggregate the production by way of including generic indicators such as growth rate of food production, horticulture production, milk production, meat & poultry production.

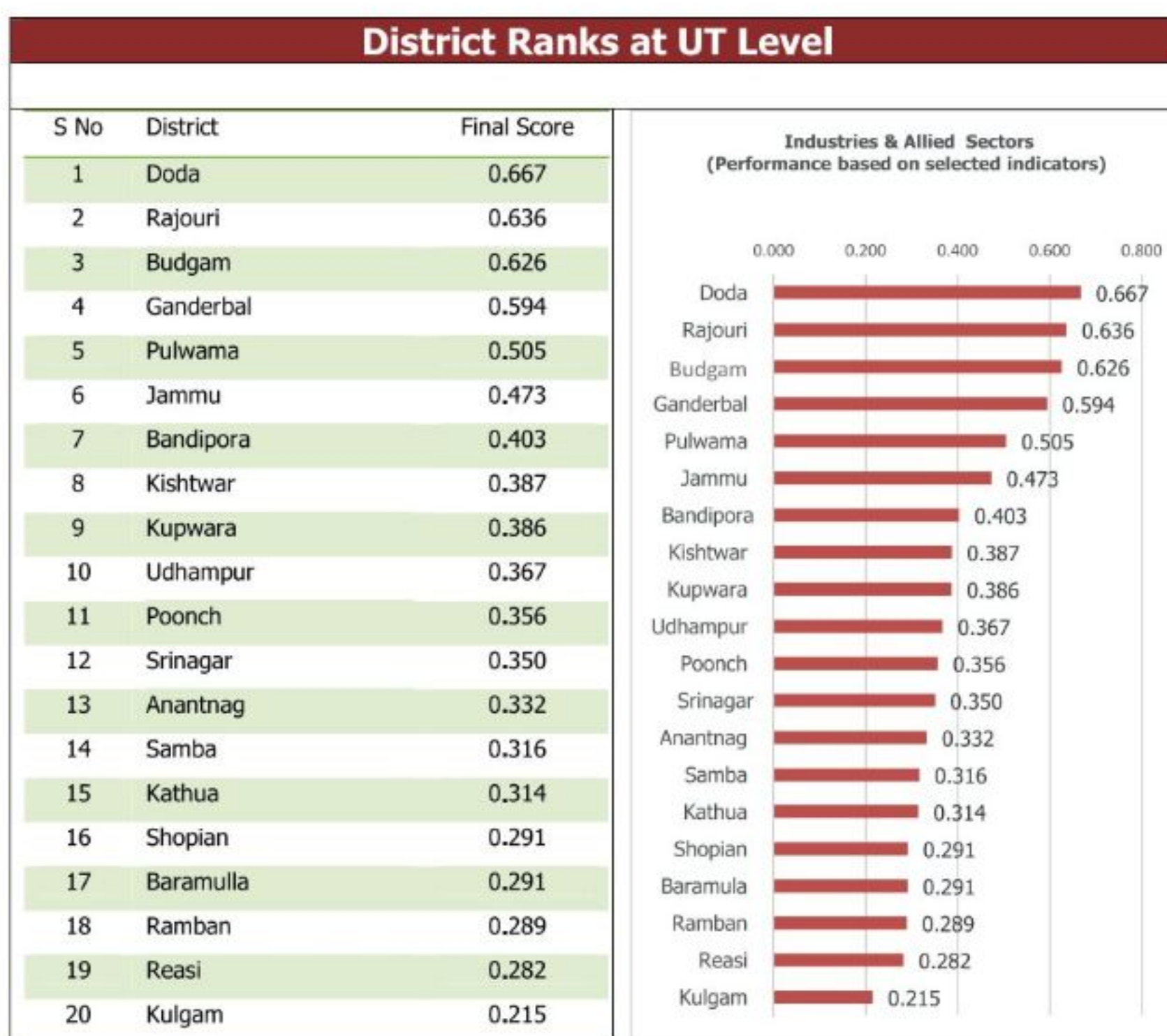

## II. Industries & Allied Sectors

Though the UT of J&K is a world famous tourist spot, the government is giving much emphasis for Industrial development in the UT to boost the economy besides mitigating the unemployment. Despite numerous difficulties and infrastructure problem, the Central and State Government are coming up with number of schemes for the development of Commerce and Industries to boost the economy, Gross State Domestic Product and generate employment avenues in the UT of J&K. The present dispensation is continuously making efforts to improve ease of doing business and achieving higher scores. Most of the indicators for this particular sector are calculated at the UT level, therefore for the purpose of DGGI some proxy indicators such as establishment registered for Good and Service Tax (GST), Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) establishments, etc are included. Tourism, being an important economic and commercial activity of the J&K, an indicator pertaining to number of tourist has been also included. Combined together, these indicators would reflect the achievement of a particular District for promoting economic activities in the District. It is critical that the recent interventions of attracting good number of diverse industries now needs to be measured by way of indicators like growth in GST registered establishments, MSMEs and credit to handicrafts & allied sectors, self employment etc.

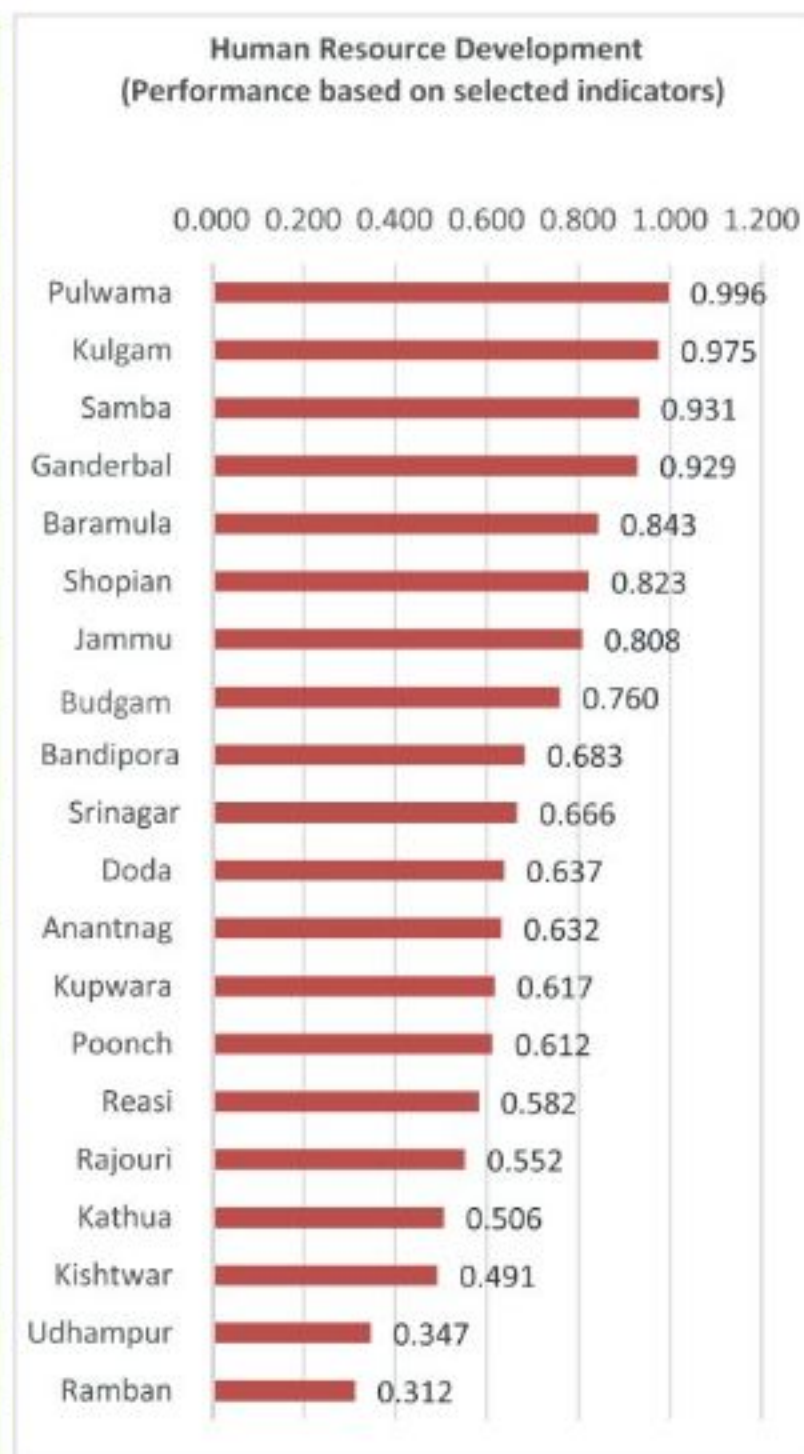


### III. Human Resource Development

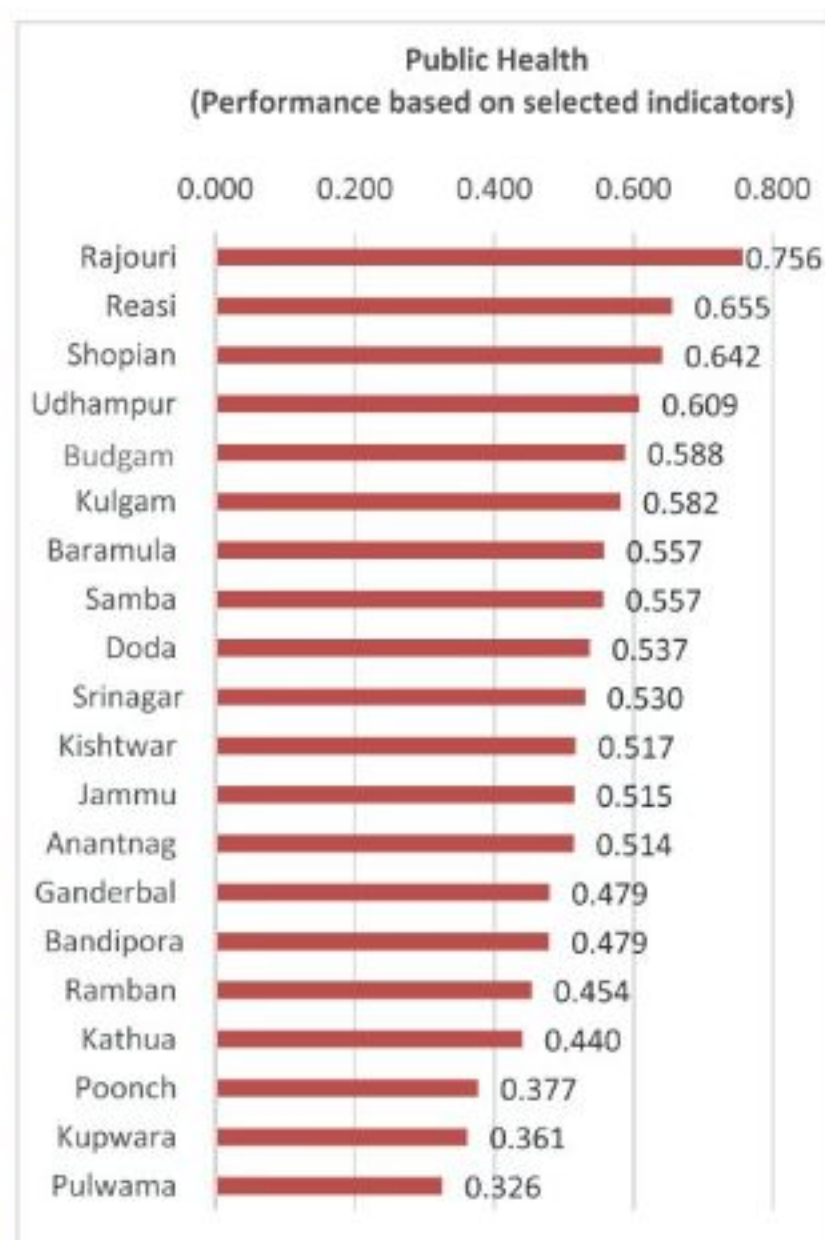


## IV Public Health

Health is a key driver of development and one of the most important social service sectors having direct correlation with the welfare of the people. The delivery of the health care services assumes greater significance in the Union Territory as large chunk of the population rely on government health care systems to meet their requirement. Realizing the importance of health care, the government is constantly endeavoring to shape, strengthen, support and sustain the health care delivery system where every citizen has access to readily available, qualitatively appropriate and adequately wide ranging health services. Steady improvements have been recorded in the demographic and health status indicators of the Union Territory over a period of time which is quite encouraging. Public health is one of the priority areas for development. Under this sector, nine key indicators are measured looking at the outcomes like Maternal Mortality Ratio (MMR), Infant Mortality Rate (IMR), Immunization achievement etc. while J&K in general is above performing UT in terms of Health parameters such as MMR and IMR. Measuring the performance of these critical indicators and comparing between the Districts provides opportunity to design targeted intervention in lagging Districts. Overall operationlization and resources availability are also captured through indicator such as Health and Wellness (HWCs), Anganwadis with own buildings etc. Similarly, other indicators in this sector like distribution of Golden card, functioning of FRUs etc. are outcome of available infrastructure, right policies and streamlined processes.

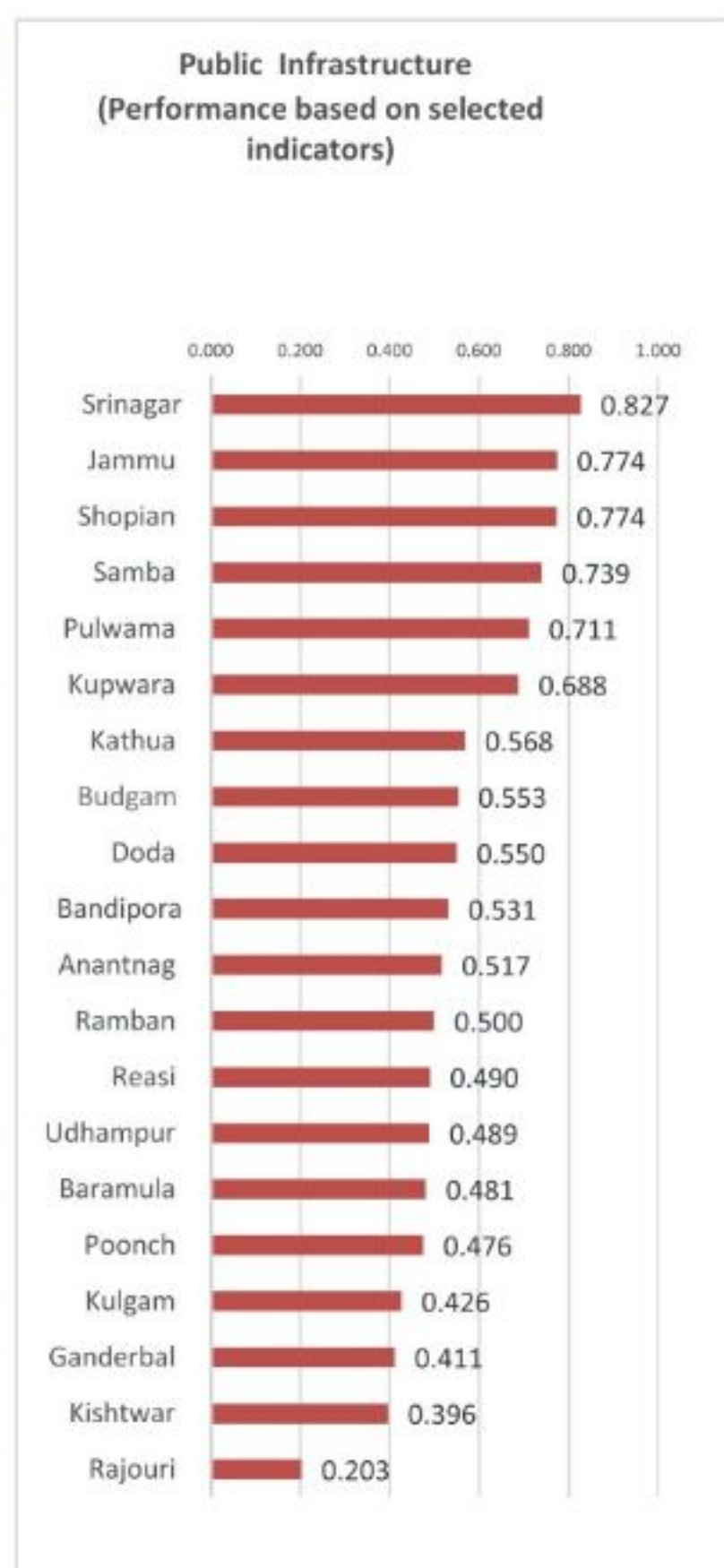

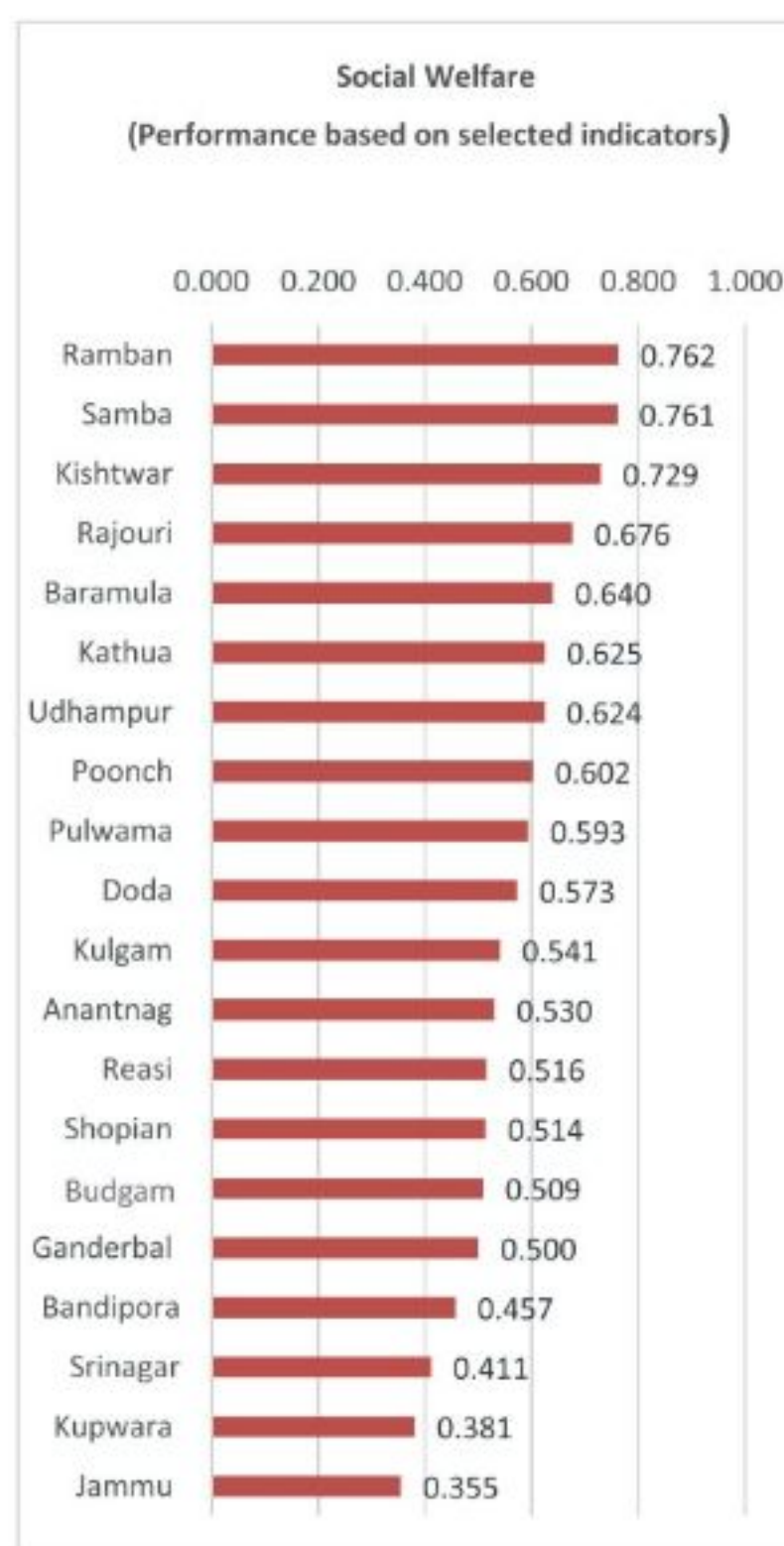


## VI. Social Welfare & Development

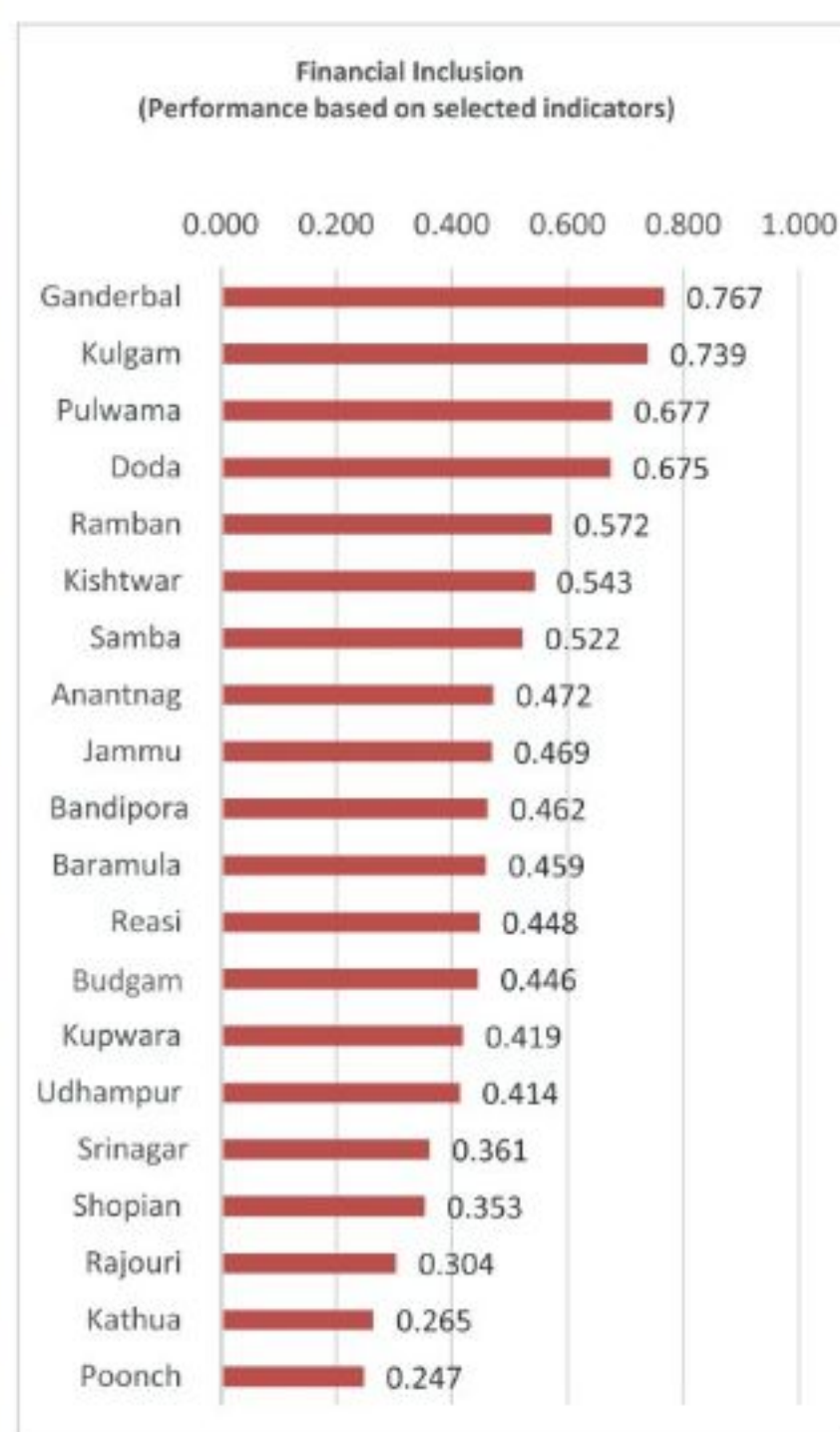


## VII. Financial Inclusion

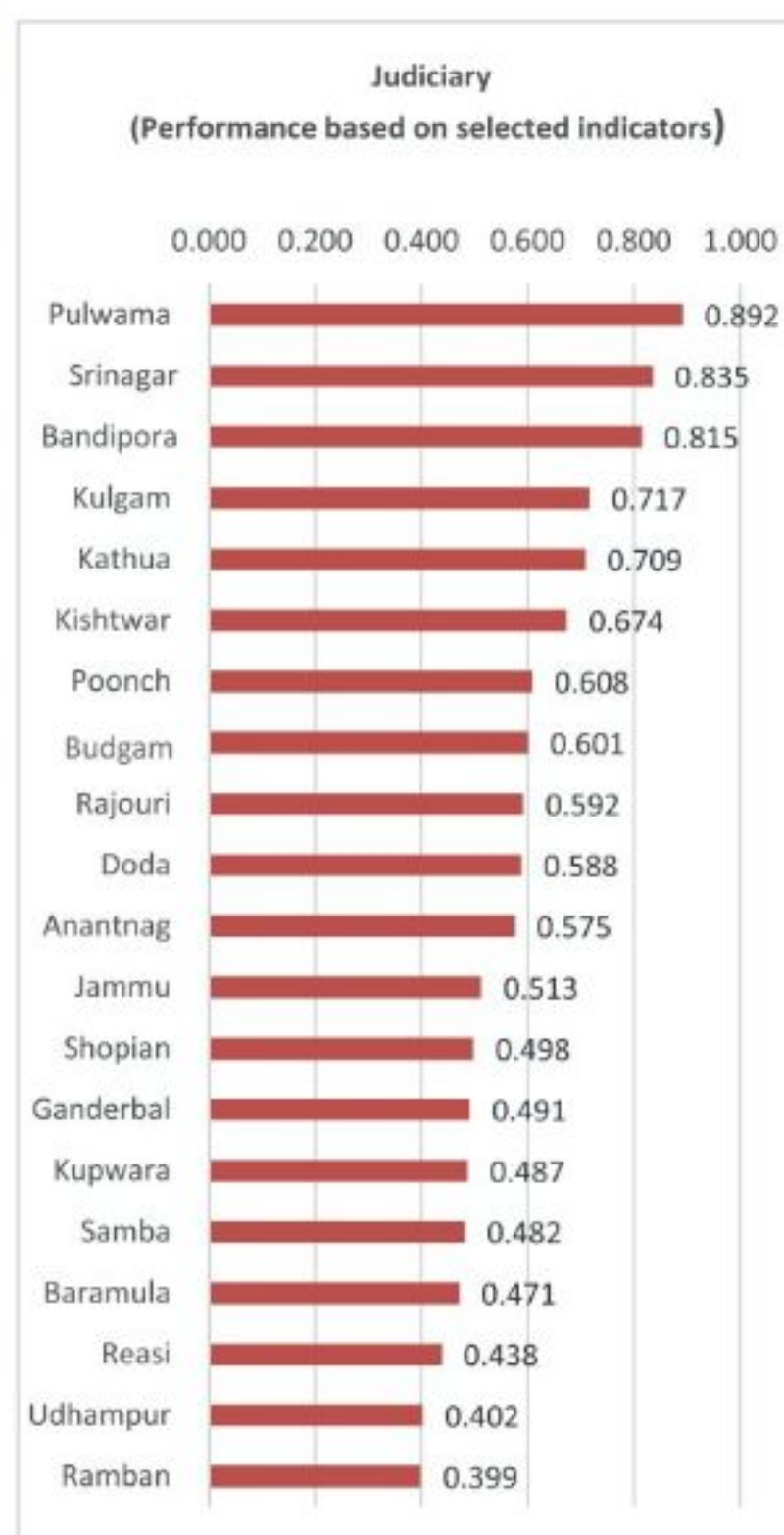


## VIII. Judiciary & Public Safety

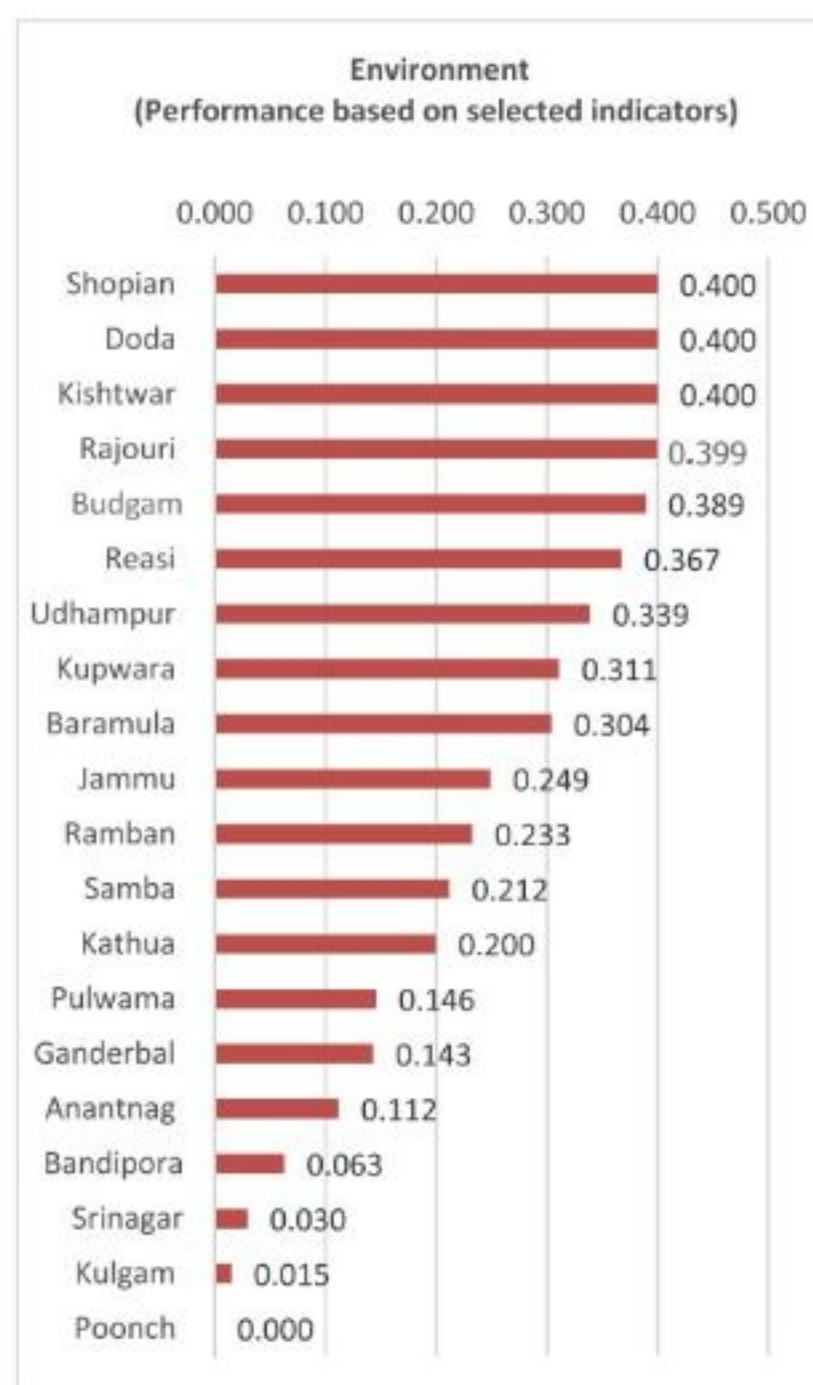

Data describing environmental indicators can be spatially and temporally referenced to understand changes to the environment over space and time and are thus an important tool in facilitating environmental governance. Hence, good governance practices can effectively and efficiently bring out better environmental outcomes that ensure reduced levels of carbon dioxide emissions, adequate forest covers, and higher consumption of renewable energy vis-à-vis non-renewable energy. Realizing the criticality of environmental sustainability for sustainable development, environment has been taken as a separate sector. As depleting forest area is a main area of concern, the change in forest area has been included as an indicator in the sector. The Indicator selection under this sector was particularly constrained due to limited availability of homogeneous data/ information across the districts. However, a beginning has been made through DGGI framework, which would be built-upon in subsequent editions of the Index.

## 10. Kulgam District

Town Kulgam (District Headquarter) is situated at a distance of about 68 kms from Srinagar and about 17 kms from Anantnag. Geographically, the district lies between 33<sup>o</sup> -15' North Latitude and 74<sup>o</sup>-35' East longitude bounded in the East and North by Anantnag and Shopian districts respectively. It is also bounded by Reasi, Ramban & Rajouri Districts in the South and South west though separated by mighty and majestic mountainous range of Pirpanchal acting as a massive topographic physical protection.

Besides places of spiritual interest viz Mir Syed Hussain Simnania (RA) at Kulgam, Sheikhul Alam Kund, Sheikh Noor-udin Wali (RA) at Chimmer, the District has tourist spots like: "Aherbal Water Fall" on Veshu Nallah which is place of sight-seeing in extreme South-West of Kulgam. 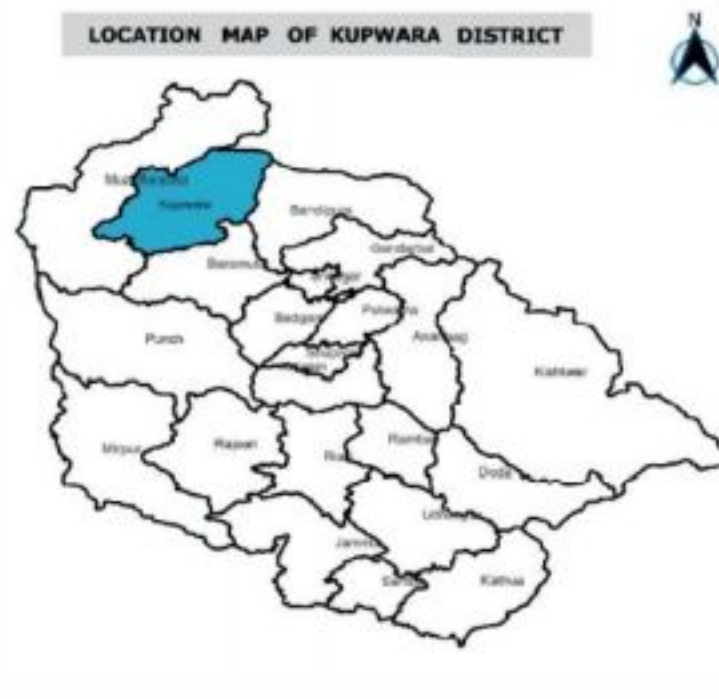

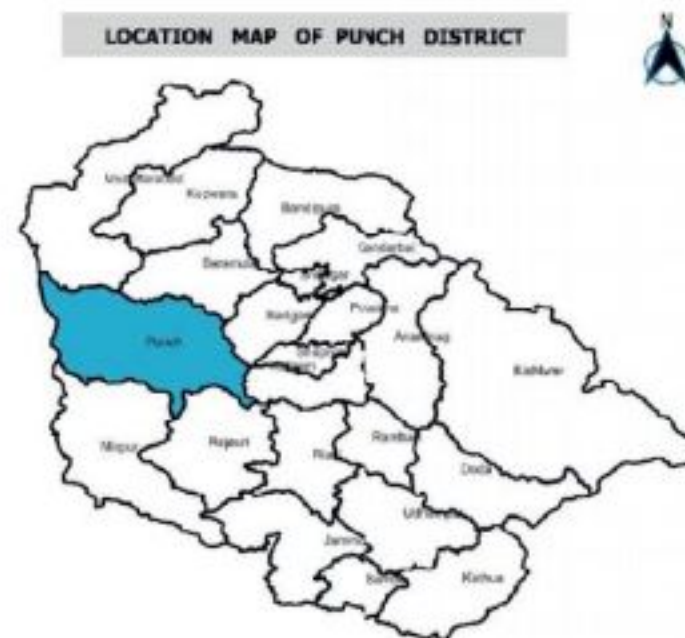

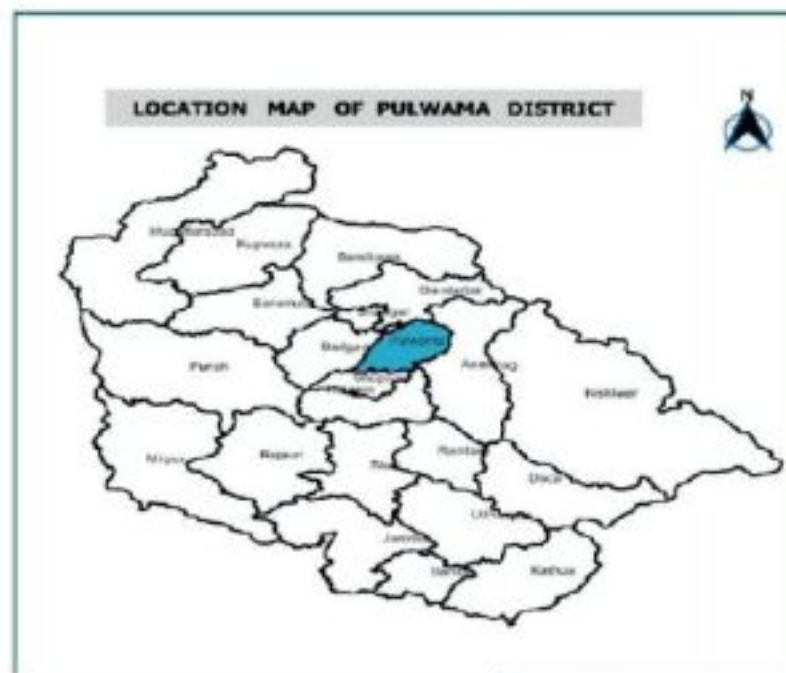
## 13. Pulwama District

## Approach and Methodology

The first edition of District Good Governance Index (DGGI) of the UT of Jammu and Kashmir which was launched in January 2022, was developed by the Department of Administrative Reforms and Public Grievances, GoI in collaboration with the Institute of Management Public and Rural Administration using 58 indicators from 10 Governance sectors. The technical support for construction of Index was provided by the Centre for Good Governance, Hyderabad whereas the data was facilitated by the Directorate of Economics and Statistics, J&K. The selection of indicators was done after having extensive consultations with the senior officers of the DARPG, GoI and UT Government. Broadly, the following principles governed in finalizing the indicators:

- Simple and measurable
- Output and outcome oriented
- Applicability across the districts
- Primarily controlled by the districts

The process for identification of indicators, used in the DGGI 1.0, has gone through extensive consultations with senior officers of DARPG, GoI and UT of Jammu and Kashmir in a series of meetings, accordingly, the same set of 58 indicators across 10 sectors alongwith the methodology adopted for construction of Index, have been used for DGGI 2.0.

### Components of District Good Governance Index Framework

The following 58 Indicators clubbed as part of 10 Sectors finalized during the process of DGGI 1.0 have been adopted for DGGI 2.0 of Jammu and Kashmir.

### Methodology for Construction of DGGI

This section provides details about data capture from various sources of data and the process followed for calculating sector and indicator-wise scores for final ranking of the Districts as described below:-

#### Step I: Compilation of Necessary Data/ Information

Computation of scores for different indicators under 10 sectors prescribed in the DGGI Framework requires data on a large number of facets covering various aspects of governance at district level. To begin with, the index implementing agency needs to fix the reference year for ranking the Districts for data compilation purpose. Particularly, for growth-based indicators, data has to be compiled for three (at least) or five years (to be decided based on the data availability) preceding the reference year. The base year used for growth based indicators in the DGGI 1.0 has been kept intact. The data for this purpose has been collected from the District Development Commissioners.

## Step II: Normalization of Indicator Values

Statistically, there is no sanity in comparing variables which are expressed in different units. Therefore, it is required to convert the variables with mixed scales into dimensionless entities, so that they can be compared and used for ranking purpose easily. This way of conversion is known as **normalization**. It helps in measuring and comparing composite indicators with ease. It also makes the aggregation of indicators meaningful. There are various methods available to normalize variables and attain scores for the Districts based on their performance on the identified indicators for compiling sector-wise/district-wise ranking. For the purpose of ranking the Districts as part of DGGI, the Dimensional Index Methodology is proposed to be used.

Dimensional Index Method is most commonly used for normalization of values and subsequent ranking. In this method, the normalized value of each indicator is obtained by subtracting the minimum value among the set from the raw value of indicators and then dividing it by the data range (maximum – minimum value). The maximum and minimum values for each indicator are ascertained based on the raw values for that indicator across the Districts combining all Districts without considering the existing Divisional (Jammu and Kashmir Divisions) categorization. This approach is specifically adopted so that such calculation would permit comparison across all Districts and can also be used for generating overall ranks without considering the categorization.

The following two equations have been used to normalise the indicator values:

### Dimensional Score for Positive Indicators:

$$\text{Score} = \frac{(\text{Indicator Value} - \text{Minimum Value})}{(\text{Maximum Value} - \text{Minimum Value})}$$

### Dimensional Score for Negative Indicators:

$$\text{Score} = \frac{(\text{Maximum Value} - \text{Indicator Value})}{(\text{Maximum Value} - \text{Minimum Value})}$$

**Where:**

**Positive Indicator = for which Higher Value is better**

**Negative Indicator = for which Lower Value is better**

**Indicator Value = Available through Secondary Sources**

**Maximum Value = Highest Indicator Value among the Districts**

**Minimum Value = Lowest Indicator Value among the Districts**

The above-mentioned equations have been used directly by taking the values of indicators for reference year. In case of the growth-based indicators, this exercise has been undertaken after calculating Compound Annual Growth Rate (CAGR) over base year to reference year for each indicator. The following equation has been used for calculating CAGR:

$$\text{CAGR} = \left( \frac{\text{Value of Reference Year}}{\text{Value of Base Year}} \right)^{\frac{1}{n}} - 1 \times 100$$

where: n = number of periods

## Step III: Assigning Weightages

### Equal Weightage to Sectors:

As mentioned earlier, while conceptualizing DGGI, various aspects of governance, like growth, development and inclusiveness need to be measured. These parameter have been

clustered under ten sectors. All the identified ten sectors are facets of equal importance from the point of view of citizen-centric approach for such comprehensive index at District level.

In addition, there is a possibility that during a particular period, one District might be more focused and channelizing its resources towards some limited prioritized sectors due to issues of area specific importance. And, at the same time, there is a possibility that one District might be giving equal importance to all sectors at once allocating resources equally/proportionately. In such scenario, there would definitely be a difference in outcomes achieved by either of the Districts. In such circumstances, the index should not provide any advantage or disadvantage to Districts for ranking purpose. Therefore, it is decided to give equal weightage to all sectors irrespective of the approach followed for ranking.

#### Differential Weightages for Indicators:

As already mentioned that outcome / output-based indicators were given priority for indicator selection and at the same time selection was restricted due to availability of data. Therefore, the outcome / output-based indicators are assigned higher weightage whereas proxy indicators (input/process based) are assigned lower weightage. Assigning higher weightages to outcome/output-based indicators brings the focus on performance and achievements of the Districts.

#### Step IV: Computation of Scores and Ranking

After completing data normalization process, the normalized value of each indicator needs to be multiplied with weightage assigned to the indicator in order to obtain the final indicator score. These final individual indicator scores are aggregated to obtain a value for the sector. These aggregated values after multiplication with sector weight becomes the score for the sector and once sector wise scores are aggregated, it becomes District's DGGI Score to be used for ranking purpose.
